

About Service Dogs

A service dog is a specially trained dog that aides people with disabilities to include those with sight and hearing impairments, mobility impairments, psychological disabilities, health issues (diabetes and allergies to name a few), and companion needs. These dogs receive specialized training according to which disability they are needed for shortly after birth. The training is intense for both dog and trainer and there are cases when a dog doesn't qualify. There has been a newer movement to rescue dogs from shelters and train them to become service dogs.




Their Gifts, Our Obligation

Butler, Kris. *Therapy Dogs Today: Their Gifts, Our Obligation.* Norman, OK: Funpuddle Publishing Associates, 2004.


This book was written as a resource for those who work with, train, and use service dogs. It points out the importance these dogs have in the lives of those they serve as well as making a show of how talented these dogs in fact are. The other role of the book is to urge trainers and facilities to take a more in-depth approach to not simply accepting mediocracy as a standard when training these specialized dogs. Butler points out that there is more involved to training a therapy dog than a regular dog, and there is the need to bring this awareness to the public so as to accept these dogs and treat these dogs as more than just someone's pet. This would be a valuable tool for those who work with and have facilities that run therapy dog and service dog programs.



Charleson, Susannah C. *The Possibility Dogs: What a Handful of "Unadoptables" Taught Me About Service, Hope, and Healing.* Detroit, MI: Wheeler Publishing, 2013. This is a book about training, raising, and working with service dogs. The author was inspired to write such a book when she herself was diagnosed with PTSD and saw the remarkable help she received through the use of a therapy dog. The book goes into a more in depth look of the realm of psychiatric service dogs and how they are increasingly becoming needed as more and more people are diagnosed with PTSD and other psychiatric disorders. She writes about the training that is needed for these specialized therapy dogs and also how the dogs aide and intervene on the part of the owner. This is a great book to read for anyone who wants to learn more about the life of a psychiatric therapy dog, which is a rather undervalued branch of dog therapy.

Davis, Marcie and Melissa Bunnell. *Working Like Dogs: The Service Dog Guidebook.* Crawford, CO: Alpine Publications, 2007.

Davis, a paraplegic for over 30 years, brings light to what service dogs do for those with disabilities that limit them in mobility. The book is a resource tool, offering check lists and tips about training and using a service dog. This is a complete resource about service dogs for anyone thinking about training them, anyone who owns a service dog, and anyone just interested in finding out more about the role of a service dog. This book even has many references, training resources, behavior expectations, and performance standards for service dogs.




Drury, Bob. A Dog's Gift: The Inspirational Story of Veterans and Children Healed by Man's Best Friend. Emmaus, PA: Rodale, 2015.

This book follows the organization, Paws4People, for one year and shows the impact that dogs have in the lives of those that are hurting both physically and emotionally. Drury begins the journey from when the pups first come to the organization to their training to become therapy dogs for young and old alike. He shows the difference that just one visit can make in the lives of one of the people who are in need, whether they are in the hospital recovering from an illness, or in an assisted living home where no one visits them, or readjusting to life after a deployment overseas. This is a touching book, looking at the many stories of the lives these special therapy dogs have touched and the invaluable work that Paws4People does in training them.


Eames, Edwin & Toni. Partners in Independence: A Success Story of Dogs and the Disabled. Hoboken, NJ: Howell Book House, 1997.

This is an all-inclusive guide that offers resources for the disabled, training service dogs, advocacy for the disabled and their uses of service dogs in public places, and how to live with and work with service dogs. The authors are a learned husband and wife team who have vast experiences in working with and training service dogs, as well as speaking out for the disabled.



Frei, David. *Angel on a Leash: Therapy Dogs and the Lives They Touch.* Irvine, CA: Lumina Media, 2011.

The author of this book may be most known by his work as the voice of the Westminister Club, the famous New York kennel club that is host to the annual Westminister Dog Show. However, he wants the reader to know that his true love lies in the therapy dog. In his book, Frei describes many of the remarkable encounters he has had with therapy dogs and the handlers they help. From speaking about therapy dogs at Morgan Stanley's Children's Hospital to visiting with veterans at the Washington DC VA Medical Center, this book includes numerous stories of the important roles these dogs play in the lives of so many who are touched by them. Frei also gives advice to the potential therapy dog handler on items like how to register your therapy dog with the proper registry, the responsibilities that come with being a therapy dog handler, as well as the importance of having the community involved too. This is a great resource for not only dog lovers, but also anyone who may be thinking about becoming a therapy dog handler.



Fridono, Judy & Kay Pfaltz. *Ricochet: Riding a Wave of Hope with the Dog Who Inspires Millions*. Deerfield Beach, FL: Health Communications, Inc., 2014.

The author of this book used her successes and failures as a therapy dog trainer to train a new breed of therapy dog: a dog that surfs with people diagnosed with PTSD, wounded warriors, special needs children, and people with other disabilities. SURFice dog is one of the many certifications that Ricochet holds. She is the only SURFice dog in the world and has become a sensation on YouTube because of what she does in her therapy sessions. While she was unable to be a regular service dog because of her love of chasing birds, she had no problem becoming a SURFice dog. Ricochet and her handler have raised thousands of dollars for charitable causes, as well as help people overcome their fears of the water or enable them to do something they once thought would be impossible for them to do with their disabilities. This would be a great book for anyone looking for inspiration to do the impossible.



Gonzalez, Katie. *The Guide to Training an Autism Assistance Dog.* San Diego, CA: Little Angels Service Dogs, 2013.

Another book in her training series of books for specific disorders, Gonzalez goes into depth of how to train your dog to become a service dog specifically for those with autism. She starts her book out the same way, with how to choose the dog that is right for the person with autism. She then explains in depth how to train your dog to help aide the autistic person in their daily activities as well as specific environments that they would need to deal with. She is quick to point out in all of her books that training your dog will be different from training a dog to have as a pet; training service dogs are trained differently also according to what disorder you are training them to for.




Gonzalez, Katie. *A Guide to Training Your Own Seizure Assistance and Alert Dog.* San Diego, CA: Little Angels Service Dogs, 2014.

The author of this book is the director of Little Angels Service Dogs, a facility that trains and gives out service dogs to people with varied disabilities. This book goes through how to pick out the dog that is right for your specialized needs. It also goes in depth of how to train your service dog from potty-training, to day-to-day activities, all the way to the more specialized tasks of how to help you in specific situations. With her training background, this is a well- written book with a plethora of valuable information to the person who wants to train their own service dog.



Gonzalez, Katie. *Training Your Own Psychiatric Service Dog.* San Diego, CA: Little Angels Service Dogs, 2011.

The author of this book includes everything a person would need to know about service dogs, beginning with how to pick out the right dog for you, to how to train your service dog for specific tasks, to training to medically alert the proper authorities. It is a complete and thorough book for a person who wants to train their own service dog. The author is the director of Little Angels Service Dogs, a company that trains and works with service dogs.



Greene, Melissa Fay. *The Underdogs: Children, Dogs, and the Power of Unconditional Love.* New York, NY: Ecco, 2016.

This book tells the story of a woman who trained her own service dog after being turned down by every agency to receive one because she was too disabled. After she found out the value of having a service dog, she wondered how many others out there were in the same boat as her. So she trained over a thousand dogs and created her dog academy, \$ Paws for Ability. In this book, the reader is shown into the world of the disabled, how service dogs can help them, and even is brought evidence from neuroscientists on the value of a service dog.

Teaming Therapy Dog



The author of this book speaks of the value of being teammates with your therapy dog and how this team approach can help in your relationship and training of the dog. It points out that a trainer and their dog must work together to be successful, and that the dog can do their best work when this teammate relationship is the focus. The author also speaks about the Therapy Dog's Bill of Rights and a new methodology of training called STEPs. This would be another valuable tool for those who are new to training therapy dogs, or to those who want to become a user of the STEPs process of training.




McClelland, Ben. Lifesaving Labradors: Stories from Families with Wildrose Diabetic Alert Dogs. Virginia Beach, VA: Koehlerbooks, 2014.

This book is about an organization that raises service dogs specifically for people with Type 1 Diabetes. Wildrose Kennels trains Brittish Labradors using their keen sense of smell to alert the diabetic person or their caregiver of when the diabetic person's blood sugar levels are too high or too low. This book explains how the dogs are able to detect the blood sugar levels and also includes true stories of diabetics who have been saved by these dogs. This book is an important book for those with Type 1 diabetes as well as caregivers and medical professionals who need to become aware of what these dogs can do.




Montalvan, Luis C. and Witter, Bret. *Tuesday Takes Me There: The Healing Journey of a Veteran and his Service Dog.* New York, NY: Post Hill Press, 2016.

This is the first children's book written by the former Army captain who was wounded in Iraq. This book is unique in that it tells the story through the eyes of the dog, Tuesday. The book tells of the travels and journeys the dog and his owner go through daily. I included this children's book because I believe it was well written enough to provide insight into a world often unnoticed by many in today's busy times. It provides valuable information about the life of a service dog and what he must be able to do everyday both to children and adults alike. The photography in the book compliments the true tale of this hero and his heroic service dog.




Montalvan, Luis C. and Witter, Bret. *Tuesday Tucks Me In: The Loyal Bond Between a Soldier and His Service Dog.* New York, NY: Roaring Book Press, 2014. This is the second book in the "Tuesday" series of children's books by the same author who tells the story of a day in the life of a service dog. What's different about this book is that it is told entirely from the dog's (Tuesday's) perspective. It is a well written true tale that allows us a glimpse into the challenging day in the life of a service dog. It goes through an entire day of Tuesday and the former Army captain he serves, and everything they do during that day. While this is a children's book, I think it is written well enough that it could provide some valuable information for both children and adults alike.


Montalvan, Luis C. and Witter, Bret. *Until Tuesday: A Wounded Warrior and the Golden Retriever Who Saved Him.* New York, NY: Hyperion, 2011.

This is a true story written about a wounded Army captain who comes back from the war with both physical and emotional wounds. After being diagnosed with PTSD and coming to terms with his physical limitations, he is made aware of the value of a service dog. This book tells of the story of both Captain Montalvan and his service dog, Tuesday, as well as the challenges both face in their new life together. The reader's eyes are opened to the actuality of PTSD and the physical restrictions endured by many service people, as well as the invaluable help of a service dog.



Patent, Dorothy H. *The Right Dog for the Job: Ira's Path from Service Dog to Guide Dog.* New York, NY: Walker Children's, 2004.

This is the story of a pup who becomes a service dog for people with disabilities other than blindness. Then as the dog grows, he gets trained to be a guide dog. The story goes through the training as a service dog and then as a guide dog and the confusion but then success that ensues. This was a well written book geared to let people know of the challenges dogs face when being trained, but how they are able to adapt and overcome.



Rogak, Lisa. Dogs of Courage: Stories of Service Dogs, Polics Dogs, Therapy Dogs, and Other Heroic Doge From Around the World. Thorndike Press, 2013.

Rogak uses her book to show the heroism of dogs from around the world who have had an impact on humans in one way or another. She tells stories of dogs who were search-and-rescue dogs who had found people missing after days, of dogs who are a constant companion and aide to the disabled they serve, of dogs who bring hope back into the lives of those with PTSD. Rogak also tells of the training these special dogs received to perform the jobs they do, as well as the honors and rewards they have gotten for their sacrifices. This book brings to light the value of service, therapy, companion, and

search-and-rescue dogs.




Scott, Cathy. *Unconditional Honor: Wounded Warriors and Their Dogs.* Guilford, CT: LP, 2015.

This book focuses on the increasing needs for service dogs, companion dogs, and therapy dogs for our active and retired military members who have physical injuries or have been diagnosed with PTSD. It is a book that tells of several stories of military people and the therapy, companion, or service dogs that serve them. It shows the important roles these dogs play in the lives of the military men and women needing the aide of these dogs, and the impact they have had on the families as well.



Shaheen, Stefany and Mark Dagostino. *Elle & Coach: Diabetes, The Fight for My Daughter's Life, and the Dog who Changed Everything.* New York, NY: Hachette Books, 2015.

This book tells the story about a medic alert dog's role in the life he saved of a young girl with diabetes. The book goes into depth about the specialized training of a dog of this nature (a medic alert dog) and how there is often skepticism with these dogs. Shaheen, the mother of the girl with diabetes, writes about how she was at first skeptical of needing a dog like this in their lives, but became a believer after the dog alerted her to her daughter's drastic change in blood sugar levels. The skepticism comes because a dog is able to do what science cannot. This was a very interesting book and one that brought light to a little talked about branch of the service dog world.



Warshauer, Sherry B. *Everyday Heroes: Extraordinary Dogs Among Us.* Hoboken, NJ: Howell Book House, 1998.

In this book, the author shares true stories of people who use guide dogs for the blind.
